# **Gallery news**

As I sit and write, I can hear the enthusiastic applause of visitors from Baptist Care/ Kularoo Gardens listening to local musicians 'Tete Noir' out on the back deck. This is just one of the many impromptu things that happen at the Gallery. We can never predict our day as we walk through the door in the morning!

We are very excited with so much going on at the gallery this year. A grant from the NSW Government under the Regional Cultural Fund means that renovations will soon begin on our new access ramp at the front of the gallery, including new entrance steps and doorway. The front of the building will be rejuvenated with a new paint scheme and the ramp balustrade will be an artwork unto itself.

It's always a pleasure to show the work of local artists and we have had such a variety in the last 9 months from the gorgeous paintings and ceramics of Yvette and Peter Hugill to the beautiful fibre works of the Manning Fibre artists and amazing insect photography of Kevin Mitchell. We were also privileged to have our talented Staff, Jane and Julie exhibit. Visitors are always impressed by the range of talented artists we have living in the Manning Valley and its satisfying for us to be able to showcase their work.

Another exciting event this year is the 4<sup>th</sup> Naked & Nude Art Prize which will be shown in September and October. The prize is gaining more national exposure, we receive entries from all points of the country, and this year, due to wonderful fund raising by the Friends of the Gallery, prize money has increased to \$31,000, which makes it a significant player in the Australian art prize sector.

Currently we are exhibiting works by Peter Schouten, a local artist, but world renowned for his paleontological illustrations which have been published in many books. Peter has previously worked with Tim Flannery on "A Gap in Nature" and this exhibition features works from his recent publication, "The End of the Megafauna". Also on show are paintings by Old Bar artist, Jennifer Catt, whose work explores our "love" of the bush, how we commonly call it fragile yet our desire to be in it and unravel its mysteries can ultimately destroy it. Angela Tay, a north coast artist, explores the intertidal communities is a metaphor for a wider world issue of population movements and displacement that I think is worth reflecting upon.

Another exciting development this year has been the appointment of Ali Haigh as the Public Programs and Educations Engagement Officer (phew) position. Ali has been extremely proactive in engaging schools and other groups with the programs here and at the Manning Entertainment Centre so we have seen many more schools groups visiting both venues as well as planning events within the school spaces. You will also notice that Ali has developed an art activity that relates to the artworks in each exhibition that children can work on while they are here.



So, a hearty welcome to all new 'Friends' members, we are so pleased to have you on board. 

# Chocolate Almond Cake

#### Ingredients

2 oranges 6 eggs 250 gm caster sugar 350 gm almonds, ground in a food processor 1 tablespoon baking power 1/2 tablespoon bicarb of soda 50 gm cocoa powder (unsweetened)

#### Preparation

1. Place oranges in saucepan and cover with cold water. Add a plate to cover and keep submerged and boil for 1 to 1.5 hours until soft. Top up water if necessary. Cool. Alternately, pressure cook on a high setting for about 20 to 30 minutes.

2. Preheat oven to 180 c.

- 3. Grease or line a 22 cm spring-form pan.
- 4. Cut oranges and remove pips.
- 5. Process almond until fine to medium meal.
- 6. Add dry ingredients to the ground almonds then add oranges and eggs. Process to combine.
- 7. Bake for 30 to 45 minutes or until it skewers cleanly.
